ENTREPRENEURIAL LAW PROJECT

One of the primary barriers for early-stage entrepreneurs is the cost to obtain legal counsel. The Entrepreneurial Law Project (ELP), a collaboration between the University of Arkansas School of Law and the Office of Entrepreneurship & Innovation, provides free access to legal education and programming for Arkansas-based entrepreneurs.

OUR SERVICES



Entrepreneurial Law Checkups

This service offers brief, **30-minute consultations**, with pro bono business law attorneys. Entrepreneurs can ask specific questions, have documents reviewed, and receive guidance on completing legal forms.

Legal Project Support

When capacity allows, we match Arkansas entrepreneurs with pro bono attorneys for more complex projects that go beyond what can be addressed in a single consultation. Entrepreneurs must first attend an Entrepreneurial Law Checkup to be considered for legal project support.



Legal Forms & Video Resources

We also provide self-service legal forms and have developed educational video resources on entrepreneurial law topics such as intellectual property, funding, and business entity selection.

THE FUTURE OF THE LAW PROJECT

1. Expanded Access through Legal Aid Designation

As of July 2025, the Entrepreneurial Law Project (ELP) is officially recognized as a legal aid organization under Arkansas Supreme Court Administrative Order No. 15.2. This designation expands our ability to serve Arkansas entrepreneurs by allowing out-of-state attorneys, including those in in-house counsel roles, to volunteer with ELP and provide transactional legal support.

2. Self-Service Legal Tools for Founders

We are launching a new digital library of Arkansas-specific legal forms—accompanied by video walkthroughs and guidance—that will empower founders to take action, even before meeting with an attorneys.

3. Statewide Roadshows & Rural Outreach

In the coming year, we plan to scale our Legal Checkup Roadshows, bringing free legal services to underserved regions of Arkansas.

4. Deeper Student Engagement

We are deepening our commitment to experiential learning by expanding pro bono and externship opportunities for law students—and launching the Entrepreneurial Law Fellowship in 2025. Fellows will support ELP operations, coordinate legal programming, and serve as ambassadors for entrepreneurial law. Through increased participation in legal checkups, roadshows, and project-based work, students will gain meaningful transactional experience while making a tangible impact on Arkansas's startup ecosystem.



5. Strengthening the Legal Ecosystem

We are building a statewide referral network and hope to expand CLE opportunities focused on startup law. Our goal is to increase the number of Arkansas attorneys equipped and inspired to work with entrepreneurs.

6. Sustainable Growth through Strategic Partnerships

As our EDA funding sunsets in 2026, we are pursuing long-term support through a diversified mix of university funding, private philanthropy, law firm partnerships, and programmatic grants.
